

From the Minister

For the first time in over two years I was able to attend Southmuir Primary School's end of term Easter assembly. What a joy it was to hear the whole school singing Spring and Easter hymns with such gusto, and to share something of the Easter message from the Easter readings that were also done. These moments are becoming more common and an indication that we still have much to look forward to.

The first two readings at the school assembly brought us to the crucifixion and then I was invited to speak. We considered the many symbols and signs that are for this time – from Easter eggs (of course) to lambs, bunnies, and chicks. We know why they are all there but I wondered if the small wooden cross I'd brought was the 'odd one out'. Every other thing we mentioned seemed to be 'good' – chocolate! cute animals! holidays! A cross surely reminds of something horrible?

Of course, that's very true, but the Easter story doesn't stop at the cross and continues to the resurrection (and that was the final reading after my bit). Easter offers a rich, deep well from which to examine and understand our faith, but that moment it was enough to consider that even after something so horrible as the crucifixion, God's love was still to be found and the promise of new life was there.

A simpler message for primary school, but one we might take to ourselves as we reflect on the many difficulties and tragedies we've faced over the last two years. God's promise is one of faithful love, even through the darkest times, and the encouragement to find new life in Him every day.

Have a blessed Easter, and may it be filled with the hope and promise of God's love. John

Bernard Ighner wrote this short poem called 'Everything must change'

Everything must change;
Nothing stays the same
The young become the old;
And mysteries do unfold
Cause that's the way of time;
Nothing and no one goes unchanged...

I share that at this time when we, as a national church, face a great deal of change. There are reviews being undertaken to assess the use of church buildings, the number of ministers is to be reduced, new presbyteries are being formed and parish boundaries are becoming more flexible.

For many of us we are facing changes in our personal lives. Whether that is due to illness, bereavement, work changes, retirement, altering family situations, moving house or something else. It can be unsettling, frightening, worrying and we are not sure how we will cope. We can be inspired and encouraged by turning to God's word and especially, to looking at God's people in the past.

Just think of the Israelites of old. They spent forty years wandering in the wilderness. They'd pitch their tents, get set up, get settled, and then the cloud or the pillar of fire would begin to move. And off they would go... again.

We too have got to move with the cloud. We've got to learn to respond to change positively. God never stays still - is always working. And we've got to learn to move and work with God.

Thomas Merton wrote one of my favourite pieces. It was a piece that helped to set me on a new path at a time of uncertainty in my life. He wrote:-

My Lord God, I have no idea where I am going.

I do not see the road ahead of me. I cannot know for certain where it will end.

Nor do I really know myself, and the fact that I think I am following your will does not mean that I am actually doing so.

But I believe that the desire to please you does in fact please you and I hope that I have that desire in all that I am doing.

And I know that if I do this, you will lead me by the right road although I may know nothing about it.

Therefore, will I trust you always though I may seem to be lost and in the shadow of death, I will not fear, for you are ever with me and you will never leave me to face my perils alone.

One way or another, today is today, and the path we are on is our pathway. How might we navigate our way? How might we not only accept the inevitability of change, but embrace and even become an active participant and agent of change?

How might we welcome change as a gift?

Perhaps by turning to God with the buoyancy of the three things scripture suggests will never change: a little faith, a little hope and love?

We'll also get to go to Seoul for a few days before the Jamboree and explore the city with our unit, who we will get to know over the next 16 months through the training process.

Financially, this trip costs £4000, and I am fundraising by holding events like an afternoon tea on the 24th of April at Memus Hall.
